Cuckooing is now a crime

The new offence of cuckooing is being introduced through the [Crime and Policing Act](#), with the aim of better protecting those whose homes are taken over and used for illegal activities.

This measure creates a standalone offence covering cases where someone exercises control over another person's dwelling without consent for criminal purposes, which is often linked to county lines drug networks.

This offence will carry a maximum sentence of five years in prison.

Creating Safer Communities

Nottinghamshire Fire and Rescue Service (NFRS) carries out Safe and Well visits in service user's homes by crews or members of the Prevention team. They are used to deliver fire safety messages and to assess the

risk of accidental fire in the home.

The format of Safe and Well visits has evolved to consider partner needs, as well as being person-centred and evidence-based.

NFRS works closely with an occupational therapist who will complete an assessment if staff identify concerns about an individual's environment, occupation or health needs.

NFRS is also running a course based on the CHARLIE-P framework.

The aim of this course is to help individuals understand the characteristics and risk factors that are common to those individuals at risk of fire. The course will also give staff the knowledge to competently complete the Charlie P Matrix using a person-centred approach.

NFRS are hosting in-person training sessions at [Highfields Fire Station](#) and [Mansfield Fire Station](#) for professionals who refer vulnerable individuals for a Safe and Well Visit.

[Research in Practice](#) has new resources available - Safety Matters: building effective practice for safeguarding adults.

Safeguarding adults means protecting a person's right to live in safety, free from abuse, neglect, violence and exploitation. Effective safeguarding is enabled through relational

working which promotes individuals' wellbeing and reduces both the risk and experience of abuse and neglect. These [new resources](#) introduce key themes in safeguarding adults.

Four key sections explore:

- abuse, neglect and recognising concerns
- making safeguarding personal
- multi-agency working
- equity in safeguarding.

The resources provide practical information and guidance along with reflective opportunities to help embed learning.

In an [accompanying podcast](#), Research in Practice explore effective safeguarding practice; discussing how safeguarding has evolved, the realities facing practitioners, and how human rights, intersectionality and equity shape real-world safeguarding practice.
