FEMALE GENITAL MUTILATION

What is FGM and why is it done?

- Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) is child abuse, it is a criminal offence and illegal in the UK
- There are NO medical reasons to carry out FGM

When can FGM happen?

There is no specific age when FGM can happen, it can occur at different times of a girl or woman's life including:

- When a baby is new born
- During childhood or as a teenager

Indicators that FGM may be about to take place

- Unexpectedly absent from school
- Female family elder visiting from country of origin
- You hear reference to FGM in conversation
- Talk about a 'special procedure' or that she is going to 'become a woman'.
- A girl may request help
- Parents state that they or a relative will take the child out of the country for a prolonged period.
- A girl may talk about a long holiday to her country of origin or another country where the practice is prevalent
- Parents seeking to withdraw their children from learning about FGM
- Has happened to another female family member

RISK Indicators: FGM may already have taken place

- Difficulty walking, sitting or standing
- Spending a long time in the toilet
- Urinary, menstrual or stomach problems
- Prolonged or repeated absences from school
- Noticeable behavior change
- Requests to be excused from PE/swimming
- Girl or family member tell someone or ask for help
- May talk about pain or discomfort between her legs

SHARING CONCERNS / IN CASE OF DISCLOSURE

The young person's safety and wellbeing is the primary concern and overrides all other considerations
